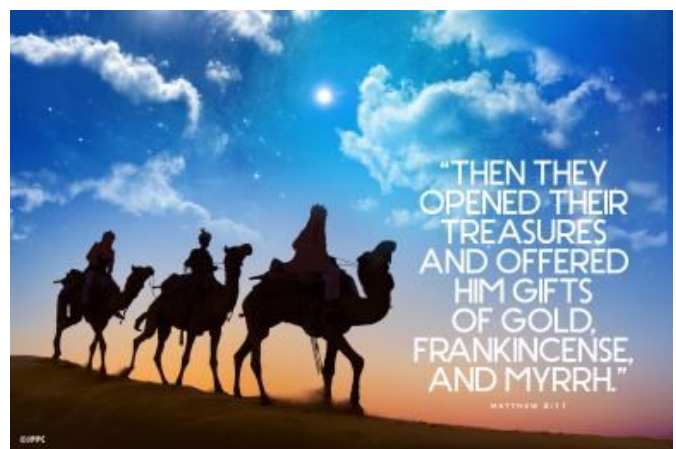

Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

From boyhood I have always loved the Epiphany story, perhaps because the magi manage to bring a touch of the exotic and color to the nearly monochrome stable scene of the first Christmas. More than that, their very arrival after a presumably long dangerous journey has always underscored the attractive power and authentic divinity of the baby Jesus. Also, the stark contrast the gift bearers make with the humble homespun couple and their newborn has always struck me with how God acts in ways that challenge our expectations.

Of course, we should not be surprised how often God does this, thoroughly upsetting our ideas about "how things ought to be." When our notions clash with His, urging us to ask for Him to change His decision, He simply refers to His prior admission that "My ways are not yours" and the added codicil "Learn from Me."

Inevitably we come to think about our personal failure in at least one aspect of our lives. One would think that after all this time, all these centuries since the Bethlehem event, and the clear teaching of the grown up Nazarene, we would not be guilty of racial prejudice. And what about this awful habit of practically naming ourselves "God's selected ones" all the time forgetting the petty betrayal of Him involved in our every sin? One could analyze that each sin of ours is like a spike of rough straw chafing an infant's skin. Or more heinous, like a thorn crowning a condemned God-Man's sacred head.

We have our work cut out for us, as in our imaginations we rise up from our knees behind the wise men when they stand up. We know they won't be going back to Herod with any report. Nor will they take the same route home. Nobody who has seen Christ goes away the same. They will have learned without any words from the Holy Infant what it takes to be truly wise. All of this is what makes the Epiphany celebration wonderful. Our Eastern rite brothers and sisters celebrate this day more than Christmas. It is the day our God revealed Himself as Someone available to everybody and not to just one race.

When I find myself tempted to join the growing number of cynics in the world beyond my front door, who seem more aggressive these days than we are in spreading their convictions, I can recall this scene for comfort. It has adorned many a Christmas card; been added to literary fiction in Henry Van Dyke's story of "The Other Wise Man," and immortalized in music as the subject of Menotti's opera "Amahl and the Night Visitors."

In my mind I see the weary camels shaking the tiny bells in their livery. I hear rustling silk in the apparel of the extraordinary travelers from the East. I smell the aroma of incense competing with the stink of the stable. And I see the look of delight on that tiny Face which I believe with all my heart to be my God's countenance.

May that same God love you throughout this New Year and give you His peace.

Rejoice in Hope; Endure in Affliction; Persevere in Prayer

From the Pastor

The Epiphany of the Lord – Today we celebrate the visit of the Magi to adore our Lord Jesus Christ. The word epiphany means to reveal, to make clear, to manifest. This Feast is given that title because the Lord reveals to the gentiles his Lordship over all. By the light of the star the magi are led to Jesus to worship him as the King and Lord of all. The Lord is always eager to reveal himself to us. He wants to lead us to himself to adore and worship him as our Savior. Look for the stars in your life that are leading you to the Lord. So often we can miss the ways the Lord is manifesting himself to us. O come, let us adore him, honor him, and serve him. He is our Redeemer and Lord.

Catholic Schools – This week we celebrate the feasts of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton on January 4 and St. John Neumann on January 5. Both of them played pivotal roles in the establishment of Catholic Schools in the United States of America. Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton (1774-1821) opened the first American parish school. She also founded the first American religious community for women, the Sisters of Charity, who dedicated themselves to Catholic education. St John Neumann (1811-1860) was the Bishop of Philadelphia from 1852-1860. During that time he encouraged the foundation and development of many Catholic schools and increased the number of students almost twentyfold within a short time. St. Margaret School was built on the rich heritage of the work of these saints. Our School was founded in 1922 and staffed by the Sisters of Mercy. Next year we will celebrate its 100th Anniversary. We are grateful for the many blessings God has bestowed upon our School and the many students it has helped to educate in faith, virtue and knowledge. Through the intercession of Saints Elizabeth Ann Seton and St. John Neumann, both of whom are depicted on our Church doors, may the Lord pour forth continued blessings upon Saint Margaret School.

Parish Theme for This Year (“Rejoice in hope; endure in affliction; persevere in prayer.”) – The wise men are wonderful examples of perseverance. They looked for many years for the star of the King of Kings and persevered through a long and treacherous journey to come and pay him homage. Their perseverance brought them great joy. It allowed them to honor the Savior and go home as different people, filled with a newfound faith, hope and joy in the love and mercy of God. May we persevere in our search for the Lord and his saving grace. The Lord will not disappoint us. He will fulfill our deepest desires and longings for love, salvation and peace.

Church Teaching: The Sunday Eucharist – The Eucharist is not only a particularly intense expression of the reality of the church’s life, but also in a sense its “fountainhead.” The Eucharist feeds and forms the church: “Because there is one bread, we who are many are one body, for we all partake of the one bread” (1 Corinthians 10:17). Because of this vital link with the sacrament of the Body and Blood of the Lord, the mystery of the church is savored, proclaimed and lived supremely in the Eucharist. This ecclesial dimension intrinsic to the Eucharist is realized in every Eucharistic celebration. But it is expressed most especially on the day when the whole community comes together to commemorate the Lord’s resurrection. Significantly, the Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches that “the Sunday celebration of the Lord’s Day and his Eucharist is at the heart of the church’s life.” (from the Apostolic letter “On Keeping the Lord’s Day Holy” by Saint John Paul II)

St. Margaret's School will hold virtual classes the week of January 4-8, 2021, and return to in-person learning on Monday, January 11, 2021.

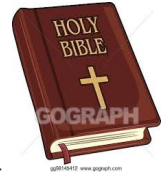
FOOD COLLECTION WEEKEND!

ANOINTING OF THE SICK

In case of serious illness, please contact the Rectory to make arrangements. If someone is already in the hospital, be sure to register as a Catholic so that the priest will visit.

COMMUNION CALLS

Parishioners unable to attend Mass regularly because of age or illness should call the Rectory to make arrangements to receive Communion at home. If any member of your family is hospitalized, please be sure to register as a Catholic and inform the Rectory so that a visit can be arranged.

SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM

The Sacrament of Baptism is celebrated on Sundays at 1:00 PM. Arrangements must be made in advance at the Rectory by calling Msgr. Dougherty, ext. 12. If parents have not attended a Baptism class, they must attend our Baptism Preparation Seminar. Call the rectory to register for the class. Godparents guidelines state that one godparent must be Catholic. They must be at least 16 years of age, registered in the parish where they live, fully initiated, and practicing their faith; they must obtain a letter of eligibility from their own parish. One practicing non-Catholic Christian may also be admitted as a Christian Witness. **The next Baptism Preparation Seminar is Wednesday, January 13, 2021 at 7:00pm in the Rectory.**

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE

Registered parishioners who wish to marry at St. Margaret should contact Msgr. Dougherty. The Sacrament of Marriage is celebrated after a period of preparation of not less than six months. Engaged couples preparing for the Sacrament of Marriage can register, explore possible dates or find out more information for pre-marriage classes by visiting **PhilaMarriagePrep.com**. REGISTRATION

A warm welcome is extended to new parishioners. You may register by calling the parish office during office hours to set up an appointment. Parish registration is required for reception of the Sacraments and letters of eligibility to serve as godparent or sponsor.

REQUESTS FOR ELIGIBILITY CERTIFICATES

The role of a sponsor is primarily a spiritual role to model a Christian life for the child. Therefore, anyone requesting a certificate must be a registered, participating member of St. Margaret Parish, a practicing Catholic in good standing (not living in violation of the church laws), at least 16 years of age and have received the sacraments of initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist). Please call the rectory for an appointment if you need a certificate.
